### Alpine Forget-Me-Not

Myosotis ( / ,maɪ.ə'soʊtɪs / MY-ə-SOH-tiss) is a genus of flowering plants in the family Boraginaceae. The name comes from the Ancient Greek μούσῳτις "mouse's ear", which the foliage is thought to resemble. In the northern hemisphere they are colloquially denominated forget-me-nots or scorpion grasses.

Myosotis sylvatica, the wood forget-me-not or woodland forget-me-not, is a species of flowering plant in the family Boraginaceae, native to Europe.

## Myosotis Plant Growing Guide | How to Grow Forget Me Not

If starting off Forget me not and other Myosotis plants indoors then start about 2 months in advance. The seeds of forget me nots should be sown in vermiculite. It will take from one to four weeks to germinate at 18 to 20 degrees centigrade in the dark. It is necessary to water the forget me nots from below to stop them rotting.

Forget-me-not, or Myosotis, is a humble but glorious spring flower, which appears in frothy blue clouds at the front of borders and at the edges of paths. It complements other spring flowers, making a great backdrop for taller tulips or wallflowers, and naturalises easily for wilder-style plantings.

True Forget-Me-Not is a larger plant with larger leaves and larger flowers (6-8 mm. across) than the native Myosotis laxa (Small Forget-Me-Not), which has flowers about 3-4 mm. across. Another species that is sometimes cultivated, the non-native Myosotis sylvatica (Garden Forget-Me-Not), has a very similar appearance to True Forget-Me-Not.

*Myosotis scorpioides* (Water Forget-Me-Not) is an erect rhizomatous perennial with delicate sprays of sky blue, tiny flowers adorned with yellow centers in early to late summer. The sprays (cymes), resemble a coiled scorpion's tail, hence the epithet. The flowers rise atop a semi-evergreen foliage of shiny, oblong, bright green leaves.

## **Forget Me Not Myosotis The**

Forget-me-nots are one of the few plants that can boast a true blue color. But the adorable and prolific blooms also come in light pink, purple, and even a clean white, and yellow centers brighten every shade. The curving stalks supporting the blooms give forget-me-nots one of their common names: scorpion grass.

## **Can I Eat Forget-Me-Nots - How To Use Edible Forget-Me-Not ...**

The true forget-me-not flower ( *Myosotis scorpioides*) grows on tall, hairy stems which sometimes reach 2 feet in height. Charming, five-petaled, blue blooms with yellow centers explode from the stems from May through October. Flower petals are sometimes pink. Forget-me-not plants often grow near brooks and streams and other bodies of water which offer the high humidity and moisture that is desirable to this species.

## **Forget-Me-Not Flowers - How To Grow Forget-Me-Nots**

This forget-me-not tolerates more heat than most. It spreads like a ground cover without taking over, and blooms from spring into summer. Grows best in moist garden soil or on the edge of a pond.

## **Myosotis sylvatica (Wood Forget-Me-Not)**

Ornamental forget-me-nots (*M. sylvatica*) are indeed edible. They grow in USDA zones 5-9. If you are sure that no pesticides

have been used, they add nice color to salads or even baked goods and make excellent candied blossoms.

Because of the common name 'forget-me-not', many people grow myosotis in their gardens to commemorate loved ones who are far away or have passed away. Germans sometimes wear myosotis on their clothing to signify faithfulness to their lovers. Myosotis produces clusters of tiny blue, pink, or white butterfly-attracting flowers above a mat-like, deer-resistant, low clump of foliage.

## **Forget-Me-Not: Uses, Side Effects, Interactions, Dosage ...**

Myosotis Sylvatica (Wood Forget-Me-Not) is a short-lived perennial with lovely bright blue, sometimes pink or white, tiny and airy, stellar flowers with charming white or yellow eyes. Blooming in dense cymes between mid spring and mid summer, the nectar and pollen is enjoyed by bumble bees and butterflies. The flowers rise atop a low mound of semi-evergreen, oblong, soft, hairy green leaves.

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
